The Facility Fund grew by \$1,160 this year. Private contributions totaled \$9,910 and we spent \$6,962 in expenses associated with the move into, and renovation of, our new office and education center and the initial conceptual drawings of our intended consolidated community campus on the 5-acre parcel on which the new office is located. For the first time since its inception, our investment account did not perform well in 2015, mirroring current market conditions.

Twenty-one people completed the 10-week curriculum for Prosperity Plus II, celebrating the benefits of camaraderie and personal engagement in enhancing each individual's abundance consciousness. We acknowledge our two facilitators, Lynden Kidd and Marya Wheeler as well as our substitute facilitators, Rev Donald Graves and Holly Baker. To celebrate these graduates and our major contributors, a prosperity gratitude dinner was hosted at the Viscount Suites in November. We look forward to engaging an even larger number of congregants with the fall 2016 offering of the Prosperity Plus II curriculum and celebrating our financial leaders at a prosperity gratitude dinner (at a different venue) in November 2016.

The Board of Trustees, Lynden Kidd, Board Chairman

The Board of Trustees (BOT) was honored in 2015 to serve the Center in many ways. As the lay business leadership we met at least monthly (sometimes more often) to discuss the vision, planning, leadership of and business of the Center. This involves not only having oversight of the day to day activities, but also of the financial and other ongoing business arrangements – including our contractual obligations with staff and the facilities where we serve. This group contributes 92 to 110 hours monthly in the furtherance of the mission, vision and expansion of CSLT. In the last year, each Trustee served as liaison to at least one, but in all cases more than one team/circle or event. That meant that in addition to specific board activities, each board member supported other groups within the Center. Plus, as we developed our 'Five Bold Steps' to advance the growth of our Center and our 'Dashboard' of activities to attentively monitor, each Trustee had responsibility for supporting CSLT's advancement in those areas too. Notably:

- Keith Gorley, Vice President Teams: Ushers, Altared States. Bold Step: Overall focus on congregants' quality of life experience/transformational growth and living.
- Renee' Mezzone, Secretary –Teams: Bookstore, Membership and Host Team. Bold Step: Overall focus on volunteerism.
- Dick Laird, Treasurer –Teams: Funding, Facilities, and Hospitality. Bold Step: Overall focus on stewardship, financial and properties where we serve. Our consolidated community campus.
- Holly Baker Teams: Sacred Cinema, Compassionate Heart, and Photographs and Memories. Bold
 Step: Overall focus on attendance.
- Lynden Kidd, President Teams: Board of Trustees, Marketing and Communication, Community
 Outreach, liaison for several events and chief promoter of volunteer appreciation activities. Bold
 Step: Overall focus on the Big Picture/Vision
- Rev. Donald Graves Teams: Practitioners, Visioning, Music, program liaison for the Living Spirit 12-Step Program and TSW Night, and responsible for the overall Sunday Celebration Experience. Bold Step: Overall focus on Education.
- Rev Janis Farmer (not a Board Member, Recording Secretary to the Board and Associate Minister overseeing day-to-day operations.) Teams: Marketing and Communication; plus assisting with education and ecclesiastical needs as appropriate. Bold Step: Communication within and outside the community.

Key activities of the board this past year included:

- 1) Drafting an Identity Statement, an Ends Statement, articulating big bold vision and mission statements, and the Five Bold Steps to accomplish our objectives.
- Collaborated with Team Leadership to clarify and ratify our Identity and Ends Statements, articulating big bold vision and mission statements, and the Five Bold Steps to accomplish our objectives.
- 3) We worked with Dr. John Waterhouse, who led our community envisioning to further clarify our big vision, bold steps and dashboard approach to measuring what we expect of ourselves. Dr. Waterhouse also helped us energize the vision for what has become the new office location and our center's home on a consolidated campus.

- 4) We leaned into our vision for a consolidated campus and moved into a new property at 4200 River Road with the intention of purchasing the property in the near future and developing it further for our needs.
- 5) We conducted a survey of our community revealing the following:
 - a. 70% were very satisfied with being part of our Community
 - b. 32% learned about us from a friend or colleague
 - c. 70% were inspired by Sunday Services
 - d. 24% found us using the internet
 - e. 68% were very satisfied with our educational offerings AND with opportunities to volunteer with us
 - f. 74% are very satisfied with applying insights gained from CSLT to life
 - q. 72% are very satisfied with the learning opportunities in classes and Sunday messages
 - h. 63% attend CSLT events for spiritual growth and/or maintenance
 - i. 63% express interest in Rev Donald's message
 - j. 62% come back because of interest in our philosophy as a way of life
 - k. 10% 'found us' as a result of the Tucson Festival of Books
 - I. 66% find they are happier as a result of CSLT
 - m. 64% are more satisfied with their lives since finding CSLT
 - n. 62% report that their thinking has changed because of what they've learned with CSLT
- 6) We've set the stage to shift the date for our annual meeting and yearly review in 2016 to happen earlier in the year allowing the leadership to conduct a planning cycle, which is more logical and supportive of the schedule in past years.
- 7) We've developed a ministry review, to be implemented in 2016, which allows the leadership to canvas and know more fully how we are doing in all aspects of our ministry/service.
- 8) We emphasized succession planning for our board's leadership assuring that there wasn't a void and that the transition could be well planned, anticipated and thoughtful.
- 9) We were blessed to review and approve the Letter of Call for Rev. Janis Farmer to serve as the Associate Minister at our Center.
- 10) Other important work of the Center is detailed in specific reports accompanying this one; but note that the fiscal integrity and prosperity of our Center is always held as one of our most important duties. We are vigilant in our review and confidence in our financial health and future.
- 11) The Identity and Ends Statement follows:

Education Team - Board Liaison, Rev Donald Graves

Fifty-three students completed CSL Certificated Classes, which included:

Foundations of Science of Mind Practitioner - Year One (started) Edinburgh Lectures (Troward)

Visioning Meditation is More Than You Think Power of Your Word

Wednesday nights' "The Journey" series, included workshops and short classes offering spiritual practices, experientials, expanded perceptions, inspiration, and information; each designed to facilitate participants in this Journey of life. "The Journey" brought in 592 students during the year, and it was so successful, that it will continue with some of the old favorites along with some new material for 2016. Feedback from participants was solicited in December through the newsletter. All were positive and desired to see "even more".

Guest Speakers during the year included: Ministerial Student Glenn Swain, RScP, Dr. John Waterhouse (who also lead our envisioning), Terry McBride (with his workshop), author May McCarthy (with a workshop and participation at the Tucson Festival of Books), our own Pat Masters, Eddie Watkins and

Karen Drucker (with their Sermons-in-Song), and our own and newly "reverendated" Rev Janis Farmer took the platform several times. Such variety keeps us fresh!

Community Inreach/Outreach - Board Liaison, Lynden Kidd

A priority for the Center for Spiritual Living Tucson is to be recognized and make a difference in our local community. It has been important for a number of years for the greater Tucson area to get to know us and have awareness of the terrific community we have. To that end, on an annual basis we look for opportunities where we can have a presence – preferably in front of groups of potentially like-minded audiences. In 2015, we committed to participating in a number of events and activities which allowed us to 'show up' well and to share who we are and what we are about. The following is a list of offerings, activities and events, both inside and outside our Center, in which we participated to advance our spiritual community in our local community.

Routinely, we offer: 1) a bookstore, 2) a Facebook community, 3) a website and 4) advertise our services and events (including special musical artists) in Natural Awakenings Magazine, a local monthly publication. Additionally, we actively tithe and support a local program; Youth on Their Own, which receives the benefit of 5% of our financial prosperity each month as part of our contribution to our local area. In November 2015, Youth on The Own was again selected by the congregation to receive our 2016 local charitable contribution.

Other Key Teams

- Altared States Team: Altared States has no official team lead. Pat Masters was the contact person for the beginning of the year and Sue Mason picked up the responsibility. Altared States worked with a small crew over the summer months with two members out of town for several months and others on vacation. The remaining team doubled up and worked together. We added three new members this year and hopefully that will stabilize the Team through the coming summer months. With everyone back for the winter and the new members we now have, we are eight persons strong.
 - New altar cloths were professionally made up this year after the cleaners shrunk the existing cover. We now have two full sets of linens, so we have back up and a bit of variety for the altar dressings. We had a slip up one Sunday when no flowers showed up for the altar. Now we have two permanent artificial floral arrangements (one for the altar and one for the piano) stored in a bin near our locker for back-up. Sue Mason hosted a luncheon in December for the team to thank them for a year of service, introduce new members and provide an opportunity for socializing. All is well heading into 2016.
- Photographs and Memories: Serina French (Lead) with support of three photographers, Dennis Eaves, Jon Lopez and Bill Spurgeon. Photographs have been taken of the House Blessing ritual at the new office, the Holiday Potluck and Prosperity Fair, Ugly Christmas Sweater Contest, "Celebration of Light" and "Endings & Beginnings" as well as of prosperity speakers, new members, special musical guests, portraits of some of the extended leadership team and many more social events.
 - Our team is now creating a continuous loop DVD of special moments, shared with our CSLT family throughout 2015 to be shown before and after Sunday Celebration Services on February 7th.

- The Bookstore Team is led by Leah Hamilton, with Shelly Dunn serving as a Team-Leader-in-Training. We are students of Science of Mind volunteering our time to provide the Center with current resources to support personal growth and education in spiritual practices. We coordinate with other CSLT teams to provide enriching experiences and outreach for congregants and community members. We provide a friendly and exciting place to shop while making a significant financial contribution to the operation of the Center.
 - In 2015, we again participated in our booth at the Tucson Festival of Books. We were also pleased to offer books from special guest speakers at the Center. Shelly specializes in children's titles and coloring books while Leah enjoys searching out new titles on topics of personal transformation. We intend to attract additional volunteers in 2016 to more fully staff our table each Sunday. Our estimate for volunteer hours at the Bookstore in 2015 is approximately 235 hours between all the efforts of our participants. This does not include the time spent moving the bookstore during out recent office move, not the time that Carla has spent in putting together a wonderful space for our lending library in our new classroom. Total sales this year were \$8,109. This number is substantially increased over last year due to the increase in number and variety of classes, book studies and other books brought to the congregant's attention by the many and varied speakers we have enjoyed this year.
- Compassionate Heart, led by Britt Mbuthia, completed its 5th year of service. We were joined by 4 new members and are now a team of 12. We continue to meet quarterly. Meetings were held January 10, April 11, July 8 and October 10. The team participated in the Spring and Fall/Winter Holiday Potluck Celebrations.
 - Our mission statement remains the same: Compassionate Heart serves our Center with love, kindness and joy, embracing the wholeness of each individual, while supporting and comforting people, when they experience a challenge. Services provided include: Making calls, visiting home and hospital, sending cards/emails, bringing meals, giving rides etc., and we love to be of help, when somebody in our congregation needs a helping hand.
 - **Total services during 2015 totaled 281 hours.** 140 calls, 78 emails, 17 cards, 74 visits, 23 meals, 4 rides, 2 flower bouquets
- O Community Envisioning: In early April, we held a two-day community envisioning process, facilitated by Dr. John Waterhouse to contemplate how we wanted to move ourselves collectively forward in our vision. More than 20 community participants joined Dr. John Waterhouse in envisioning for our Center. The evening session was filled with great intention making and resulted in a list of items for future exploration including our 'beacon' or tower with violet light at the top. Saturday the group continued work with the identity statements both internal and external plus the Five Bold Steps and metrics to support our being on course as we move forward. The group also visited the 4200 N River Road property and offered a blessing. Only when we arrived at the property did we realize that a tall windmill stands at the entrance of the property that easily could be a representation of the violet beacon that arose in our visioning exercise. Recognizing the importance of good communication skills within our Center, Dr. Waterhouse also led the group in an important exercise to remind us of the value of clear, frequent and direct communication.

- c Lunch Bunch. The Lunch Bunch was spun off from the Compassionate Heart team and found a willing home within the extended Hospitality Team. This crew, led by Karen King RScP, meets at a local restaurant following the Sunday Celebration Services on the third Sunday of the month. A wide variety of restaurants have been selected, and visited, to appeal to the diverse tastes of our congregation.
- Sacred Cinema began the year hosted by AJ Johnson, who relocated mid-year. Cinema was picked up by Saundra Kalajian with an assist from Jon Lopez RScP, and provided a monthly movie opportunity and fellowship. The movies shown included: The Secret, Hideaway, Jonathan Livingston Seagull, I AM, Spontaneous Evolution, August Rush, Powder, The Way, The Sessions and Guardians of the Galaxy. Our lending library of previously shown films continues to grow. The quality of our movie showings improved drastically with the move to the new office location with a special donation of a new "built-in" flat screen television, sound-bar and DVD player.

Internal and External Events

- Tucson Festival of Books. This was our fifth year at the Tucson Festival of Books (March 15-16) where over a dozen engaging volunteers handed out affirmation cards, tri-folds and guest packets with information about us. This year we again had an ideal location on the Festival Grounds, near the food court, which lead to higher visibility and the opportunity to have a greater impact in the Tucson community as a whole. It allowed us to be "found" by those who had forgotten we were here, didn't know where we had moved to, or who may not have met us before. This year we featured author May McCarthy, and her work The Path to Wealth, Seven Spiritual Steps to Financial Abundance. May also spoke at Sunday Celebration Services and held a workshop. Judy Roman served as coordinator for May's visit.
- May McCarthy. May interacted with the public at our booth during the Tucson Festival of Books for more than three hours on March 14th, spoke to an audience of 99 during Sunday Celebration Services and conducted an informative workshop with 23 in attendance. Several of our congregation continue to use the prosperity enhancing processes which she brought to us.
- Congregant Feedback. We inquired about the level and source of congregant satisfaction with our offerings using an online survey during May and June. Forty-nine individuals responded, most of whom are regular attendees of our services. The greatest desire expressed by many respondents was for us to have a home of our own. Additional information about the survey is presented in the BOT Report section.
- Eddie Watkins. This weekend was hosted collaboratively with Unity Spiritual Center of Peace. A song-writing workshop was held on Saturday. Eddie provided sermon-in-song for the Sunday Celebration Services, which were attended by 109 persons. The 70-minute concert, held at Unity of Peace was attended by 60 individuals, all of whom were either congregants of one of the two centers or their invited guests.
- Posi-Palooza. The second annual Tucson PosiPalooza was presented on November 15 by Karen Drucker, Sue Riley and Daniel Nahmod. There were 164 persons in attendance, an increase of 50 persons more than had attended the previous year. This event was also co-sponsored by Unity Spiritual Center of Peace. Karen also provided sermon-in-song during the Sunday Celebration Services with 125 in attendance.

- Second Annual Prosperity Fair. The Prosperity Fair was held concurrently with the Holiday Potluck and Celebration on December 13 after Sunday Services and was shepherded by Peggy Jo Hays and Shelly Dunn. Fifteen congregants advertised their wares or services. The Fair this year was chilly, though well attended; many congregants stayed around and enjoyed seeing what others did to support their prosperity away from Sunday Services. Total sales were \$218 from booth fees and individual tithes on sales that day. Approximately 30 volunteer hours were invested in putting on the fair.
- In-House Ritual Celebrations. We had four in-house ritual celebrations this year. 1) In celebrating the Reaffirmation of Vows, approximately 20 of us remembered that our first relationship was with our own selves. 2) After we moved into our new office and education center location, roughly 30 of us held a House Blessing to make this space ours. 3) In the Celebration of Light, approximately 50 of us remembered that we are from, and of, the same One Light. 4) During the Endings and Beginnings Ceremony, 72 of us had the opportunity release anything that no longer serves us and step into a new more-enlivened version of ourselves.

Facility Team-Board Liaison, Dick Laird

The first part of the year was spent looking at additional properties and renegotiating our lease with The Gregory School. In April, a property was identified on River Road that met our criteria and negations were entered into. We could not reach agreement on purchase, but did enter into a 1-year lease agreement and in June the office was moved from North Alvernon Way to 4200 River Road. More than 22 volunteers contributed over 600 manhours to the move and installing new kitchen cupboards and appliances. New curtains and rods were donated and installed as well as a flat screen TV and many other improvements including new bathroom vanities and security lighting. Trees were trimmed and branches moved to improve parking. The lending library was finally unpacked and put on bookshelves. Additionally, the front door lock was replaced and the screen door refurbished. Many thanks to the legions of volunteers who made the move and all the improvements possible.

We continue to look at land opportunities to keep up with market comparables to facilitate our intent to purchase the land at 4200 E. River Rd. As a reminder, we envisioned this new space as the location of our permanent sanctuary and consolidated campus. The property is five acres and ideally suited to our needs. The owner seems to be willing to sell this property to us and we continue in this discussion.

Host Team - Board Liaison, Renee' Mezzone

Our vibrant Host Team with five active members continues to welcome and inform our growing congregation on Sunday mornings! Whitney Vale has taken a sabbatical after serving as host for three years (thank you, Whitney, for your inspired service!) and the ever-effervescent Holly Baker has stepped forward to fill the opening. We feel blessed to be the face and voice welcoming everyone to CSLT on Sunday mornings.

Hospitality Team – Board Liaison, Dick Laird

Throughout 2015, the Hospitality Team provided hospitality on Sundays, consisting of coffee set-up and, on most Sundays, by supplying the snacks, as well. On Potluck Sundays, the team also arranged the dishes that others brought for the potluck. Set-up and clean-up on these Sundays required additional

work. During 2015, there were special events, such as the town hall meeting and the prosperity fair, to mention just two, that resulted in extra planning and work by the team. The Hospitality Team periodically held social / business meetings during the year at McMahon's and Monterey Court. Other meetings took place at the office. Of significance during 2015, the team grew to 10 members, including folks who could be tapped "on-call." Also, a monthly schedule was developed whereby at least two members would be on-duty on regular Sundays and three or four on potluck Sundays. This allowed for consistent, predictable, coverage while allowing "Sundays off" for team members. Throughout the year, improvements were made including the addition of several plastic table cloths, the formulation of written instructions to assist new members and a goal to provide more balanced snacks, such as fruit and other gluten-free items. The Hospitality Team also committed to support the re-invigorated Lunch Bunch. As the year came to an end, several more improvements were in the works, including better signage, outreach to newcomers, and the encouragement of others, outside of the team, to provide snacks. The willingness of team members to be flexible, for example when all the chairs and tables are gone from the dining hall or the electricity is out, is particularly of note. Hospitality will continue develop its processes in 2016. Volunteer hours for the Team totaled approximately 360 hours for the year. The team also developed a Mission Statement: "The Hospitality Team joyously supports the Center for Spiritual Living during Sunday celebrations by providing refreshments and opportunities for fellowship, by hosting social gatherings on other occasions, and by extending a warm welcome to all."

Marketing / Communications Team (MarComm) – Admin Liaison, Rev Janis Farmer/Board Liaison, Lynden Kidd

The Marketing/Communications team is a continuing example of a team functioning well without a defined team lead. Each team contributor has unique skills, which come into play on an as-needed basis. We continued our advertising with "Natural Awakenings" and the Dex Yellow Pages. We provide both electronic and paper promotional materials for speakers and musical events to New Thought Centers throughout southern Arizona.

Our electronic newsletter is a huge success in part because, each week, we have an article written by a board member, and a practitioner, and often photographs of activities and events that occur in our community. We've also featured of our ever popular in-house and external musicians. We have over 630 sign-ups for our weekly electronic newsletter.

We have also gained 162 additional "likes" on our Facebook page, to bring our total to 610. Over the course of the year we have been blessed with three photographers, Dennis Eaves, Jon Lopez and Bill Spurgeon. CSLT Music Ministry Volunteer Representative, Anna Mello-Lewis participated in the following events on behalf of our Spiritual Center: PosiFest Music Awards and Sound Connections Conference in Tampa Florida, Fundraiser Invitation for New Vision Spiritual Center in Phoenix, AZ, with Jami Lula, calling for participation from other spiritual centers in surrounding areas to increase peaceful collaboration.

Volunteer Recognition/Patio Jam occurred on May 23rd. Volunteers from the Center were acknowledged with an evening of fun, music, socializing, certificates, t-shirts and gelato. The CSLT Orchestra and The Singin' Sistahs volunteered their time and talent for an evening of entertainment.

Six people from the music team met in and shared some ideas for our own CSLT Call to Celebration Song. The first song was written by Leona Freeman and debuted on June 28th with the Singing Sistahs, CSLT Choir and Orchestra. It was well received by the congregation. A second Call to Celebration song was written by Anna Mello-Lewis and shared with congregation. Some modifications were made to simplify it and permission was given for Anna to go ahead and record it on her upcoming CD to be released in March, 2016.

During 2015, CSLT Musicians were featured in the newsletter with short biographies and a picture. Our main guitarist Stuart Oliver resigned his position with the CSLT Orchestra to take a position as music director with another congregation. Shawn Kebler filled his position. Our back-up musicians included Peter Schnittman, Alan Anderson and Michael Bronner. We continue to keep eyes open for additional back-up musicians, in the event that our regulars cannot play for a Sunday service.

During July, we experienced both sound Techs out of the country for four consecutive weeks and the back-up plan failed to deliver recordings. All sound amplification was provided by personal amplifiers and stage mics. Discussion continues to occur about having a more procedural plan in place, should something like this happen again in the future.

During the month of December, four volunteers from the music ministry team agreed to represent CSLT in the upcoming 2016 PosiFest Awards/Conference. Those attending will be Anna Mello-Lewis, Abbie Small, Leona and Mike Freeman. These individuals have participated in discussion about new fundraising

ideas to help support future participation in this conference and the expansion of our center though music.

Practitioners – Board Liaison, Rev Donald Graves

During 2015, Practitioners participated in each Sunday Celebration Service by providing a pre-service 15-minute Sunday meditation, evocations, high watch, and the opportunity for individual prayer during and following each service. In early 2015, our Practitioner Core was strengthened through the addition of Jon Lopez, who joined us from Atlanta GA. In 2015, we experimented with "The Prayer Cloud", and in greatest part, we like it. Over 430 took part in the Sunday morning meditations, over 260 individual 1:1 prayer treatments were shared, and the Truth was known for more than over 180 written Ministry of Prayer requests and more than 58 web prayer requests. These spiritual leaders also led a few of the Wednesday night Journey series classes, participated in the Burning Bowl/Threshold Ceremony, the House Blessing, the Reaffirmation of Vows and the Celebration of Light. Practitioner's Corner for the Newsletter and compiled or wrote the monthly Thoughts and Affirmations. Most members participated in a 3-hour advanced training on Grief Counseling offered by Rev Donald. They are always available individually for affirmative prayer or spiritual counseling, or anonymously through the on-line prayer request, or by placing a prayer in the Ministry of Prayer box.

Usher Team - Board Liaison, Keith Gorley

The team, led by Donna Hall, has retained most of the ten members we started with in 2015, needing to recruit only two new members during the year. And one of our team members who had been injured during the year, Alba Peart, is 100% healthy and ready to return when needed.

We don't have a leader in training after Carla Hodge began a new job, and everyone was asked again if they wanted to step into that role. If we have any trainings and/or meetings of interest, I will ask again because our newer team members could be interested.

Team volunteer hours totaled 208 (52 Sundays x 2 ushers x 2 hours each). The team is quite flexible and able to trade Sundays as needed to accommodate other CSLT activities and/or outside commitments and travel.

Our purpose statement follows: The ushers are known for offering warm greetings to all as we distribute the bulletins for the Sunday service. We help everyone feel welcome and comfortable, especially newcomers who are escorted to Meditation, offered flowers, information packets, and are shown the facility and introduced to others as appropriate. We seat latecomers (except during prayer) and count attendees. We collect the offering, and account for funds in a specified format. We do a quick check for anything left behind in the auditorium, and know we've contributed to a great experience for all attendees!

Vision Core - Board Liaison, Rev Donald Graves

Each month, the Vision Core visioned on "the highest and best for CSLT as the premier hub for transformational growth in Tucson and beyond". All are welcome to observe the process; anyone who has been trained in the visioning process is welcome to participate. A few additional members have joined the core from the 8-week certificated Visioning class. Approximately half our Vision Core

participates virtually at this time. Vision Core meets the first Thursday of each month at 6:30pm at the Office and Education Center.

Volunteer Coordination

Volunteer coordination is handled by the individual team leaders and via the Sacred Service form on the website, which is also available on Sundays on the Information Table, included in the New Member Orientation packet and offered during Prosperity Plus II. Each individual is encouraged to find his/her niche through volunteering in our Center. Each volunteer is connected, if needed, with the appropriate team leader through our office administrator.

Youth & Family Team

With limited interest expressed by members of our congregation in creating a Youth Service Team, the Board continues to consider rethinking the Youth and Family program as a means in which to provide child care for parents rather than as a specific educational program for our youth. We are in the process of identifying a space for youth, as child care or youth ministry (ages 4-10) during Sunday Celebration Services and how we would offer this to congregants. This, and the appropriate staffing of this function, is on the Board's radar for 2016.

Sue Mason



I look forward to assisting our Center for Spiritual Living, as we prepare for a new home and the continued direction of our Board of Trustees.




Jon William Lopez



After 20 years in New York working at various production houses and animation studios, during which he worked on a variety of animated commercials, educational films, TV specials and a 1976 bicentennial animated special ("Days of Liberty") for ABC (which he directed and received an Emmy nomination for). 
